

Landed at Shalfleet. Thomas Rowlandson

Depicted here are the four central characters of the 1791 tour, who are following the two sailors having just landed at *Shalfleet*.

Rowlandson is probably the first figure in front of the other three, who are believed to be *Henry Wigstead* (in striped trousers), supported by *Samuel Howitt* and another.

This is a unique view of this inn's interior, which was built about 1744.

Henry Wigstead is seated on the left, Samuel Howitt on the far right and Thomas Rowlandson is sketching at the table. An unidentified person (possibly George Morland) is between Rowlandson and Wigstead.

The *New Inn* was built circa 1750. There appears to be a gazebo type structure in the garden of the inn.

An earlier building known as the "Church House" had burnt down about ten years earlier".

This view shows *St Michael's Church* from the west. The farm in the foreground is probably *Parsonage Farm*.

The massive Norman tower had this ungainly cupola on it in the 18th century. In the early 19th century this was replaced by a small spire, which remained on the building until 1912.

View of the village of *Shalfleet* with Shalfleet Church in the distance. The farm in the foreground of the painting is probably *Parsonage Farm* and the church appears to be shown from the west.

This view of *Shalfleet* is believed to show the *New Inn* public house, which is still in existence today.

Circa. 1790s

In medieval times *Newtown* was a flourishing port. The town was originally called *Francheville* (i.e., Freetown), and only later was it renamed *Newtown*. This cottage might be the "*Frenchville Arms*".

This view between *Shalfleet* and *Yarmouth* is probably at *Ningwood*, where our four gentlemen tourists are being conveyed on chairs on a cart, drawn by three horses in a line.

The state of the forded road highlights the lack of money spent on highways before the 19th century.
