

Community resolution

What is a community resolution?

A community resolution is something you can be given by the police because of behaviour you have committed that is against the law.

There are two types of community resolution:

- Police-led – This is where a police officer gives you a community resolution and may let the youth justice service know, but you will not be contacted by the youth justice service.
- Youth justice service-led – The police will issue you a community resolution and will refer you to the youth justice service. The youth justice service will contact you to offer some support to hopefully avoid getting into trouble again.

Who is the youth justice service?

We are a team of people who work together to try and support young people to make better choices with their behaviour and avoid getting into trouble with police. Engagement is voluntary.e

What do I need to do?

You will be offered appointments each week (unless told otherwise) where you will meet with someone from the youth justice service. Initially, we will speak about what happened and why. We will ask questions about your life including friends, school, lifestyle. This will help us to work

out how we can provide some support to help you avoid this behaviour again.

You will need to attend appointments as asked to by the youth justice service.

- Be on time.
- Do not attend under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- Let your youth justice worker know if you have changed number or address.
- Let us know if you need to change or cancel an appointment, we may need to ask for proof if you are unable to attend.

What if I don't?

When young people do not agree to work with youth justice service, the police are told. The police may then take this information into account and deal with the young person more harshly if they are in trouble again.

Your rights

If you are unhappy about how you have been treated by the youth justice service you can tell us by:

- speaking to your worker, or a duty worker;
- phoning the youth justice service manager;
- asking for information on how to make a complaint.
